Routes into Teaching: the basics

The main training routes:

1. University-led training

- This route caters for those who want to learn teaching theory before going out into the school environment for placements.
- Usually one-year full time course with a minimum of 24 weeks in placement in schools.
- The PGCE will lead to QTS (qualified teacher status) and may also include Masters modules.*
- Students who train to become a teacher via this route may be eligible to a tax-free bursary or a scholarship.
- PGCE can also be offered through a SCITT (School-centred initial teacher training)

 *Dependent on qualification provider. Students are advised to check this.

2. School-led training

- This teacher training route will suit those who prefer a more hands-on approach to learning.
 Students work within teaching placements and complete teaching theory alongside this.
- Students spend more time in the classroom than those via the university-led route.
- Students achieve QTS (qualified teacher status) with most providing a PGCE which is likely to carry Masters-level credits.*
- There is an expectation but not a guarantee of employment within the training school at the end
 of the scheme.
 - *Dependent on qualification provider. Students are advised to check this.

To train as a teacher via the School-led approach, students can consider one of the following routes:

a) School Direct (unsalaried tuition free programme)

- Schools recruit and train teachers on-the-job, via partnerships with other schools and a university.
- This route leads to QTS status (qualified teacher status) usually via PGCE, with potential to also gain Masters-level credits.*
- Usually one year full-time
- Available to graduates with a 2:2 or above, with potential eligibility for a bursary/scholarship to assist with training.

b) School Direct (salaried)

- An employed route for teacher trainees. Graduates are usually expected to have a minimum of 3 years transferable work history. *
- Candidates receive an unqualified teacher's salary from the school. Training costs may be covered but candidates may be charged for PGCE fees if awarded.**
- Typically viewed as an option for career-changers.

*Some schools may be willing to accept someone with less than 3 years' work experience, especially in certain subjects. Applicants should check directly with the training provider regarding entry requirements.

**Candidates should enquire about training costs directly with the school they are applying to.

c) Postgraduate Teaching Apprenticeship

- Similar to the School Direct route. Candidates are paid an unqualified teacher's salary as you train.
- Training involves a combination of classroom teaching and off-the-job training as you work towards Qualified Teacher Status (QTS).
- Candidates also take an end-point assessment (EPA) in the final term to ensure you're on the right track to be an effective newly-qualified teacher.

d) School-centred initial teacher training (SCITT)

- England based only teacher training programme.
- Similar to School Direct (non-salaried) programme, they are run by schools or groups of schools, and may partner with a university.
- Most of the training is delivered in schools by experienced teaching staff. Candidates are based in a school from the start of the programme.
- This programme typically suits applicants who want to gain a teaching qualification and who already have a lot of school experience.
- Many SCITT courses include a PGCE or Masters credits, but applicants are advised to check with individual providers for more information.

e) Teach First Leadership Development Programme.

- 2 year salaried programme aimed at highest calibre graduates looking for career in classroom leadership/education management.
- Trains teachers to work in schools in low-income communities across England and Wales.
